

# **Parking**

A friendly reminder of the paramount importance of parking safety during school pick-up and drop-off times. Your vigilance and consideration are vital to ensuring the safety of our students and maintaining a secure school environment. Please observe the following guidelines:

- 1. Designated Zones: Use designated drop-off and pick-up zones whenever possible. Avoid stopping in non-designated areas to prevent congestion and potential hazards.
- 2. Speed Limits: Adhere to posted speed limits within the school zone. Drive cautiously, especially in areas with heavy pedestrian traffic.
- 3. Pedestrian Crossings: Exercise extra caution at pedestrian crossings. Always yield the right of way to pedestrians, and do not block crosswalks.
- 4. No Double Parking: Refrain from double parking, as it obstructs visibility and disrupts the safe flow of traffic.
- 5. Consider Others: Be considerate of our neighbors when parking near the school. Avoid blocking driveways and be mindful of residents.

If you travel to school by car, do not stop (ever drop off or pick up) on "School - Keep - Clear" arkings. Park well clear of the school entrance. A stationary car can prevent a driver seeing a child crossing the road. Don't be pressured by bad weather into parking too close to the sch better a wet coat than a visit to the A&E!

### **Bonfire Saftey**



As we approach the Bonfire season, I want to take a moment to discuss an important matter that concerns the safety and well-being of your children. Fireworks, although thrilling, can pose serious risks when handled irresponsibly or without proper supervision. It is crucial for you, as parents and guardians, to ensure your children's safety and prevent them from misusing fireworks.

The use of fireworks is regulated by various laws and regulations to minimise the risks associated with them. The primary legislation governing fireworks is the Fireworks Regulations Act 2004, which restricts the sale, possession, and use of fireworks, especially among individuals under the age of 18. It is essential that you familiarise yourselves with these laws and regulations to uphold your responsibilities as parents and guardians. Here are some key points to consider:

- 1. Age Restrictions: Under UK law, it is illegal for anyone under the age of 18 to possess category 2 and 3 fireworks in public places. Retailers are also prohibited from selling category 2 and 3 fireworks to individuals under this age limit.
- 2. Responsible Supervision: If your child is under 18 and wishes to enjoy fireworks, please ensure that they are always under the supervision of a responsible adult. Fireworks should never be left in the hands of children or teenagers.
- 3. Noise and Nuisance: Fireworks should not be used in a manner that causes distress to others or constitutes a nuisance. Misuse can lead to noise complaints and potential legal consequences.
- 4. Legal Consequences: The police take firework-related offences seriously. Robust action will be taken against anyone found committing offences such as underage possession, antisocial behaviour, or misuse of fireworks.






### **Holiday Fun**


