What is Diversity Week?

School Diversity Week encourages equality for all people, including those from the LGBT community. Diversity Week has been launched nationally, with the support of the Department for Education, the week empowers pupils and school staff to take responsibility for tackling homophobic bullying. In 2021, schools representing over two million pupils and school staff will take part.

When will Diversity Week Sessions Take Place?

Diversity Week Equality Sessions will take place on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, during the last lesson of the day.

Why are we observing Diversity Week?

- The aim of diversity week is to spread awareness and remove stereotypes, so that our pupils develop into respectful, tolerant and socially aware adults, with a knowledge of the wider world and how diverse our society is.
- Schools and their governors have a legal duty to ensure all forms of bullying, including homophobic bullying, are tackled under the Education and Inspections Act 2006. This responsibility was reinforced by the Equality Act 2010 which obliges us to promote understanding about LGBT equality and challenge discrimination and prejudice.
- Ofsted will assess approaches to educating our young people about LGBT+ issues and bullying. Involvement with School Diversity Week has been commended by Ofsted as an indication that a school is fulfilling these responsibilities.

Will Diversity Week conflict with my faith, culture or beliefs?

Diversity Week does not teach children to be Gay.

All activities during diversity week will be delivered in a way that respects all faiths and beliefs, whilst promoting tolerance and equality.

One of the key values in many religions and cultures in our community is compassion for others, which is one of the main aims of Diversity Week.

The department for Education believe that initiatives such as Diversity Week will; prevent bullying based on perceived differences

and

prepare them for life in a diverse modern society.

Is my child too young to discuss issues related to sexual orientation and gender identity?

Teaching will be age appropriate and respectful of faith and diversity

In line with our legal obligations, schools are committed to educating young people about LGBT equality and the importance of challenging prejudice and discrimination in age-appropriate ways.

This is also true when we tackle other forms of discrimination – on the grounds of race, religion or disability, for example – at all ages. Schools should have a zero tolerance approach to homophobic bullying at any age.




