Being aware of social media



7 essential questions about social media

Is your daughter old enough to use certain apps?

Most sites like Facebook, Twitter, SnapChat, WhatsApp, and Instagram require all people signing up for their service to be 13 years old. They each claim to use 'age screening' to ensure all members are of age.

What is your child doing and sharing online?

Are they just chatting with friends or looking to share events in their life. Each App has a unique focus and intent. Talk to your children about what they are using and why.

Is your child's information private online?

Read the privacy settings and understand what they are agreeing to upon setting up an account. Most social media service providers do not disclose their privacy settings clearly or simply. (For an example of the simplified version of Instagram Terms of Use: see Page 10 of this Report)

Is your child only sharing information with trusted people.

Ensure they are not accepting friend requests or personal information requests from anyone they do not know personally.

Is your child making sure they are never posting personal information

Phone numbers, address's or full names. These details will allow a predator to find out a great deal about you, your daughter and their habits.

Do you talk about social media with your child?

Talk with them about what they want to do and give them your opinion. You only want them to be safe and are not out to simply spoil their fun.

Remember that all social media Apps are like any tool.

How you use it is how you will find it useful.

Just a quick FYI: Hiding apps on an iPhone

Step 1: Tap and hold on an empty area of your home screen until all the apps start shaking.





Step 2: Tap on the dots that appear on the bottom.

Step 3: A collection of your pages appear in the form of thumbnails. Just uncheck the page you'd want to hide and tap on "Done".
